Charles Chester Webb

When Charles Chester Webb was born on October 8, 1903, in Taloga, Oklahoma (Dewey County), his father, John T. was 36 and his mother, Rose Etta was 23. He married Ema Mae Bell on January 22, 1935, in Pattonsburg, Missouri. They had three children during their marriage. He was preceded in death by his wife Ema, who died at the age of 51 in October of 1967. Charles C. Webb died on June 21, 1980, in Pattonsburg, Missouri at the age of 76, and was buried there alongside his wife Ema.

Timeline of his Life

1903- Born in Taloga, Dewey County, Oklahoma

1910 - Lived in Major County, Oklahoma

1920 - Lived in Council Grove, Oklahoma

1923 or 24 - Moved from Oklahoma to Kansas City, Missouri, to live with an aunt (Mrs. Alfred Furrell). Attended A.S. Copley's tabernacle and was filled with the Spirit. He invited his sister, Hattie, and his brother, Oliver W. Webb to join him in Kansas City.

1931- Ordained by A.S. Copley (along with his brother, O.W.) at the Tabernacle in Kansas City.

1931-1934 Pastored a church at St. Jospeh, Missouri

1936- Started a new work in Omaha, Nebraska

1938 - Started a new work in Paducah, Kentucky

1948 to 1950 (Somewhere in this time frame) - Built and founded Beams of Light Mission Church at 21 North Elm in Sapulpa in association with Beams of Light Tabernacle in Tulsa, pastored by his brother, O.W. Webb. Beams of Light in Sapulpa was relocated to 101 E. Murphy (at the south end of Sapulpa) in 1953.

He was pastor of Beams of Light in Sapulpa through 1955 or so (even conducting the funeral of his father there, John T. Webb, who was buried in Tulsa in June of 1954.)

1959 thru 1974 - Became associated with the Full Gospel Business Men's Fellowship International as a member, Vice-President of the local chapter, and International Convention delegate several times. He was associated with the FGBMF in Jamaica, Haiti, and Miama, Florida. In 1973, he went with the FGBMFI Rome Airlift as a delegate to the Rome Conference and was able to minister to several cities in Italy. During this time, he and his wife lived in the Miami, Florida area where she died in 1967.

1974-1976 - Pastor of the Verdigris Brethren Church in Emporia Kansas and Special Speaker as a member of the FGBMFI.

1980 - Died on June 21, 1980 and buried in Pattonsburg, Missouri alongside his wife, Ema.
